HISTORICAL SUMMARY: Known at various times as "Bonetown," "Booneton," or "Boonton," the area was named by David Ogden (an early iron mine owner) in 1761 to honor colonial governor Thomas Boone. Boonton became autonomous in March 1867 when it broke from Pequannock Township. Both the Morris Canal and the local iron industry heavily influenced the town's development. Several iron works in Boonton supplied the Continental Army with supplies during the American Revolution. Today, Boonton is largely composed of three distinct neighborhoods: The Hill, the oldest part of town which lies north of Main Street; the Park, designed in the style of Calvert Vaux, lying south of the Rockaway River; and the Flats, lying between the Jersey City Reservoir and the railroad line.
